The Singapore Trip

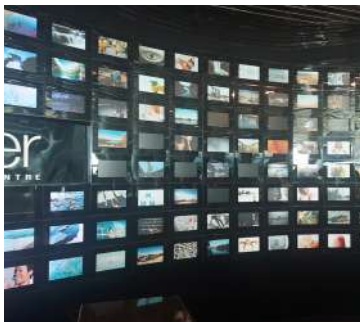
