

Director, Actor, Anchor, Educator and India Youth Icon 2010 Sattyakee D'Com Bhuyan.



Sohail and Ananya: What made you decide to become an educationist?

Director: My teachers. I found the way school teachers conducted themselves; their dedication towards students, is a way in which one can earn while doing good service to the making of good human beings. I have two reasons, the second is that there are some things a teacher should not do. If I become a teacher, I would do the things that a teacher should do.

S&A: What is your vision for this school?

D: To be even better than before. Today should be better than yesterday and tomorrow should be better than today. There is always room for improvement and there should be movement towards betterment. Focused achievement is not a goal but a journey.

S&A: What were your favourite subjects as a student?

D: English. I grew up in an Indian environment and spoke English only at school. English is a convenient language. Language is best understood when used in conversations. When you start thinking in the language, it stands beside you, in front of you and behind you. Communication then becomes easy.

S&A: What, in your view, should an ideal student be like? D: Naughty. A student should have fun, play pranks and enjoy

D: Naughty. A student should have fun, play pranks and enjoy oneself. Yet, they should give enough time to studies as they

give to other activities. An ideal student must be focused.

S&A: Do you think students today are as competitive as they used to be?

D: There is no dearth in competition. Maybe students are ever more competitive than before. The problem is focus. Many find it difficult to choose a direction.

S&A: What is the ideal teacher-student relationship?

D: The two must have faith in each other. If there is faith, everything else rolls together. Faith is established when both the teacher and the student does their job honestly.

S&A: Who is your biggest inspiration?

D: My father is my biggest inspiration.

S&A: What message would you like to give students about discipline?

D: Discipline doesn't come from books. It comes from within. It is a routine which is followed with sanctity. The sun follows a routine. It rises and sets according to its routine. The stars follow a routine. With a routine, chaos would ensue. A student's life without discipline, lies in chaos, non-performance, doubt, and lack of self-confidence being its outcome.

S&A: How long have you been associated with schools?


D: I have been associated with schools for 30 years.
