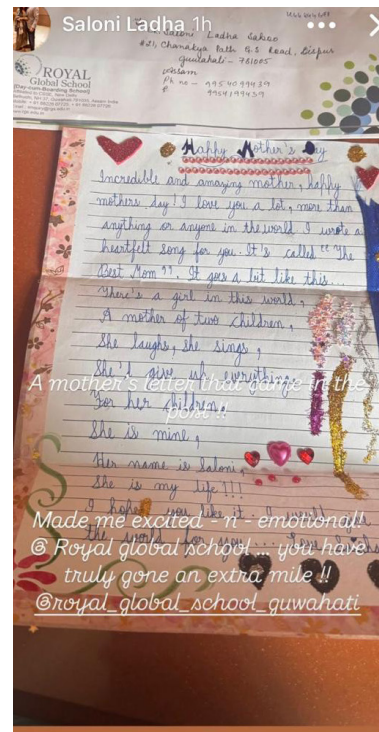
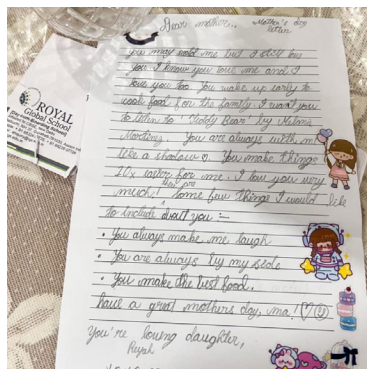
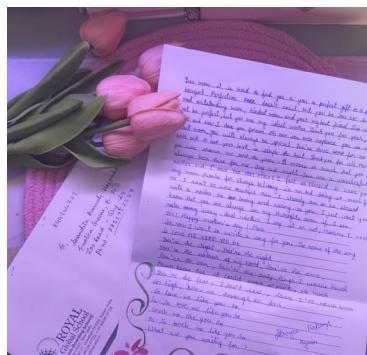
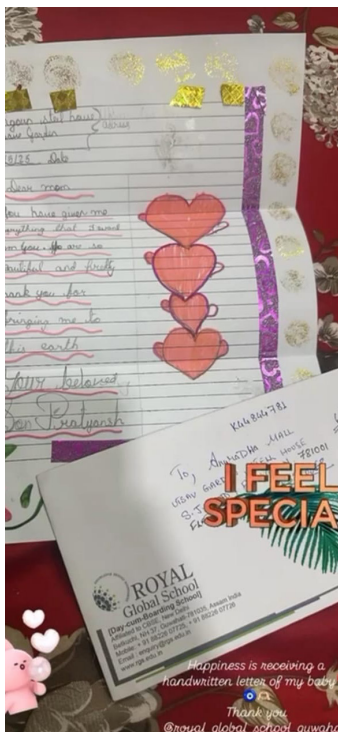
Mother's Day Celebration: A Heartwarming Activity by the students of Grades 4 and 5

On 9th May 2025, Royal Global School hosted a career counselling session in collaboration with EduVelocity, aimed at high school students navigating their higher education journey with clarity. The keynote speaker, Mr. Vinu Warriar, an expert in international education and student guidance, urged students to approach college selection like informed customers. He emphasized the importance of curiosity and selectiveness in choosing both national and international institutions, advising students to consider scholarship opportunities.

Mr. Warriar highlighted that admission criteria in countries like the US and Canada emphasize both academics and co-curricular activities equally. He suggested focusing on top-ranked programmes within colleges that align with students' interests rather than just the reputation of the institution.

Another significant takeaway was the value of leadership, stressing that leadership extends beyond formal roles to everyday actions. Students were encouraged to take initiative, whether organizing events or making small but impactful changes.

The session was highly successful, offering students a strategic perspective on approaching their future.

Biotech in Action: Students Visit RGU's Advanced Lab

"The greatest single challenge facing human biology is the development of biotechnology that can benefit humanity as a whole." — Bill Gates

On a recent educational trip, science students had the opportunity to visit the Biotechnology Laboratories at Royal Global University (RGU), Guwahati. The visit offered a fascinating glimpse into the world of biotechnology and molecular biology, with hands-on demonstrations and detailed explanations by experienced faculty members.

The session began with an introduction to advanced lab equipment such as the centrifuge, PCR (Polymerase Chain Reaction) machine, gel electrophoresis apparatus, and UV transilluminator. Students learned how these instruments are used to isolate, amplify, and analyze DNA — core techniques in both research and diagnostics.

One of the most engaging parts of the visit was observing cell division under the microscope. Students were able to clearly identify the different stages of mitosis and meiosis — including interphase, metaphase, anaphase, and telophase — bringing textbook theory to life.

The highlight for many was a demonstration on DNA extraction from blood samples, where students saw how genetic material is isolated for analysis. They also learned how a spectrophotometer is used to measure DNA concentration in a sample.

Using quantitative PCR (qPCR), the students observed how real-time amplification helps quantify DNA in a given sample. The faculty explained that Ct (Cycle threshold) values play a key role in interpreting results — with values above 30 indicating a low concentration of DNA, a point that drew much curiosity and discussion.

Overall, the educational trip was both enriching and inspiring, offering students a practical understanding of molecular biology and the powerful role biotechnology plays in modern science and medicine. It also sparked a deeper interest among many students to pursue future studies and careers in this dynamic field.



MUN Workshop at Royal Global School

Royal Global School successfully organized a Model United Nations (MUN) Workshop on 17th May 2025 at the school Colosseum with the aim of introducing students to the structure, format, and purpose of MUN conferences. The session also aimed to cultivate an understanding of global affairs, diplomacy, and international cooperation among the student body.

The workshop was conducted by Mr. Chinmay Kalita, a well-known and experienced MUN trainer. With his in-depth knowledge and dynamic presentation style, Mr. Kalita managed to create an atmosphere that was both intellectually stimulating and accessible for students new to MUN. He began by explaining the basic structure of MUN, the roles and responsibilities of delegates, and the importance of research and position papers.

He further elaborated on the rules of procedure, including motions, points, and the flow of debate, ensuring that students understood how to confidently participate in formal discussions. The trainer emphasized key skills such as public speaking, diplomacy, negotiation, critical thinking, and collaborative problem-solving—all of which are central to succeeding in a Model UN setting.

To keep the session interactive, Mr. Kalita engaged students in a short demonstrative session giving them a feel of how real MUN conferences unfold. These activities gave an idea to the students about parliamentary language, formulate arguments, and develop confidence while speaking in front of an audience.



The workshop concluded with a vibrant question and answer session, where students actively posed insightful questions related to MUN processes, global issues, and strategies to excel as delegates. Mr. Kalita answered each query with enthusiasm, further motivating the participants to take part in future MUNs.

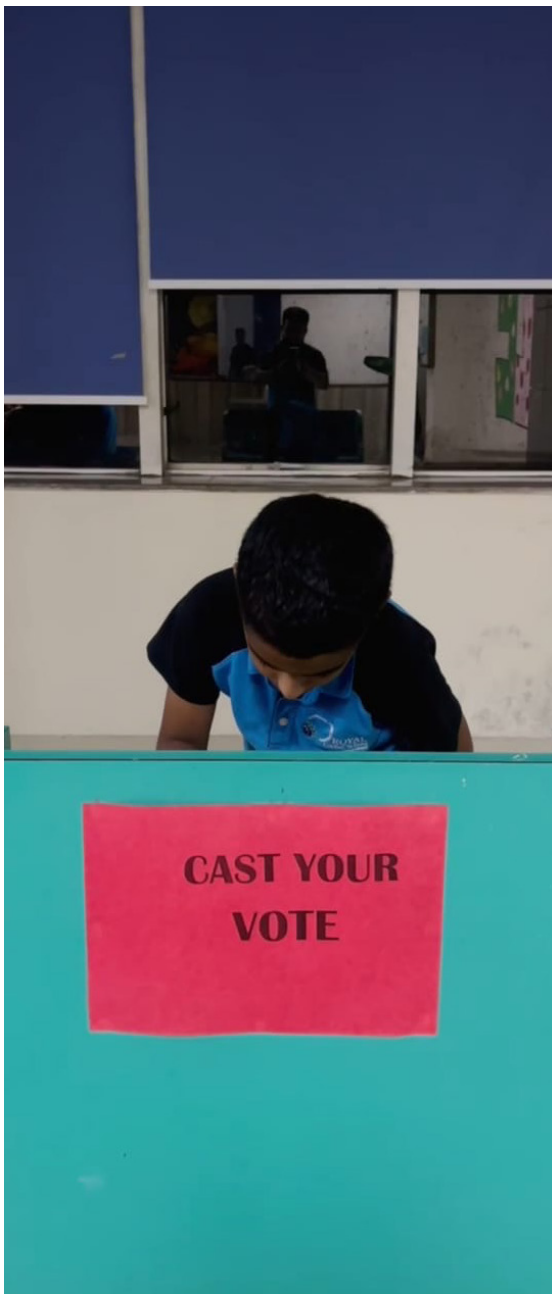

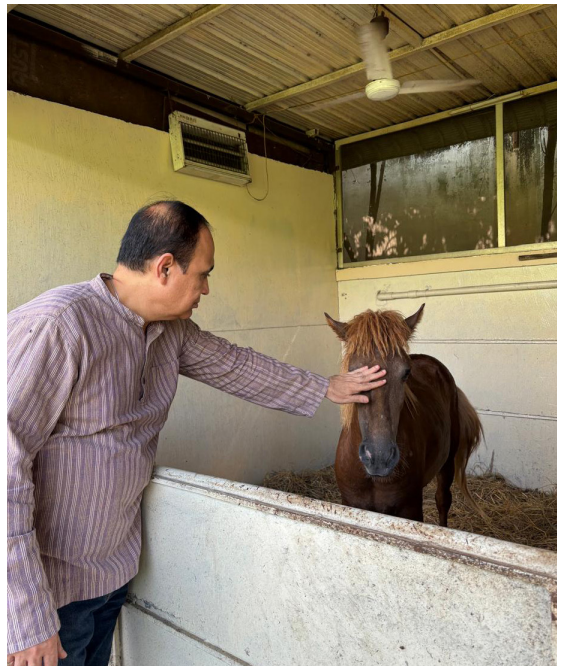

A Splash of Creativity: Hostel Drawing Competition at Amaltas

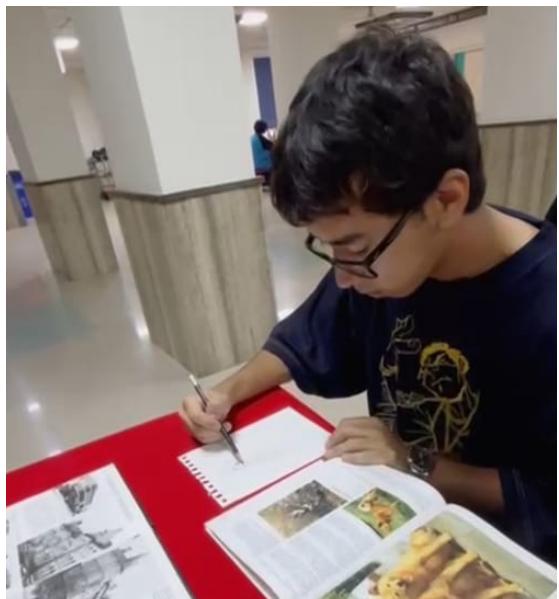

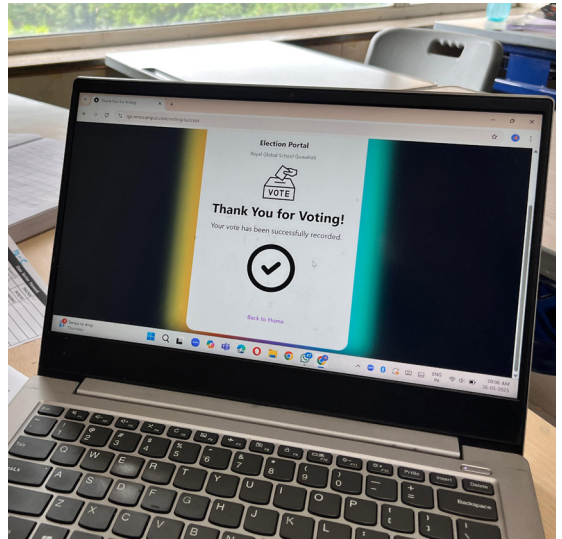

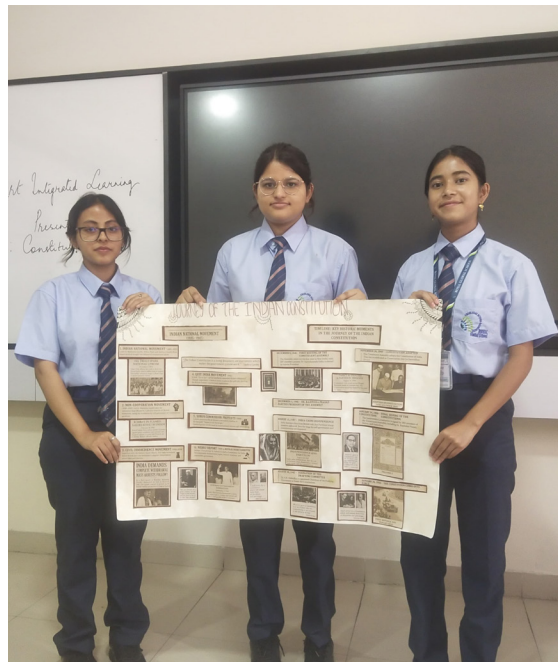
Art-Integrated Activity: “The Journey of the Indian Constitution”

Posters and cartoons added layers of visual storytelling, addressing critical themes like Gorbachev’s reforms and the end of the Cold War. The highlight was a role-play titled “Gorbachev’s Dilemma,” where students enacted scenes capturing the ideological and emotional turmoil of a collapsing regime.

UTSARGA Club Visit to the Slum Areas of Maligaon

The students of Royal Global School visited the Maligaon slum area on 28th May 2025 as part of an initiative by the Utsarg Club. The objective of the visit was to interact with the families residing there and gain insights into their daily lives—especially in relation to housing, education, and the support they receive from government welfare schemes. They interviewed several families who generously shared their personal experiences and challenges. Despite limited resources, inadequate sanitation, and cramped living spaces, there was a remarkable level of resilience among the residents.



Many families live in extremely modest conditions, with primary earners bringing home minimal incomes, often in the low thousands per month. Yet, they continue to prioritize their children's education, viewing it as the key to a better life. Several children are enrolled in nearby government schools, and parents expressed pride in their academic progress. However, a few families are still struggling to secure admissions due to issues like a lack of documentation, unawareness, or school capacity constraints.

There was a strong sense of community spirit. Residents support one another emotionally and materially, creating a network of mutual assistance that sustains them through difficult times. Their ability to find joy and hope amid adversity was both inspiring and humbling.

The visit to the Maligaon slum was an eye-opener. It revealed not only the harsh realities of urban poverty but also the indomitable spirit of those who live through it every day. These families, though facing financial and infrastructural challenges, display a strong commitment to progress—especially through education.

This experience reinforced the importance of targeted government support, community-based development initiatives, and increased awareness about education and welfare rights. With continued effort and attention, there is great potential to improve the quality of life for slum dwellers and help their children access opportunities for a brighter future.

Visit to Bikaji Foods International Ltd., Amingaon, Assam

On 29th April 2025, the Class 12 Commerce students embarked on an educational field trip to Bikaji Foods International Ltd., located in Amingaon, Assam. The visit offered a practical glimpse into the operations of one of India's leading snack manufacturers.

Upon arrival, we were warmly welcomed by Mr. Rubul Bharati Nath, the HR Head, who briefed us on safety protocols. Equipped with masks and hairnets, we were split into groups and guided through the facility by Mr. Mohidul Islam, the Production Manager.

We began with the Moong Dal Snack line, observing each step from cleaning and frying to packaging. The use of palm oil, chosen for its stability and taste, was explained, along with the origin of raw materials—most from Bikaner, while vegetables like potatoes are sourced locally from Assam.

Next, we visited the soy stick and potato chips sections. The chips were fried at temperatures up to 190°C, producing five unique flavours. It was fascinating to learn that even rejected potatoes are reused to make Alu Lacha, minimizing waste.

The packaging and quality control units were a display of automation and precision, with machines ensuring compliance with FSSAI norms and efficient labelling. We also learned about the Digital Despatch System that tracks stock across India.

The factory's output is impressive—20–30 tonnes daily, with monthly sales exceeding ₹10 crores. The visit concluded with refreshments and a token of appreciation presented to the Bikaji team. This visit enriched our understanding of manufacturing, quality control, and business operations, offering real-world insights that went far beyond the classroom.

Round Square :Show and Tell

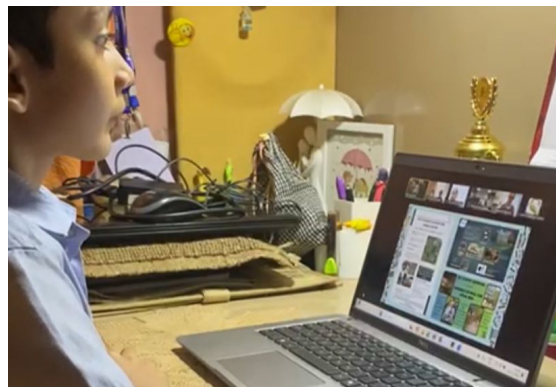
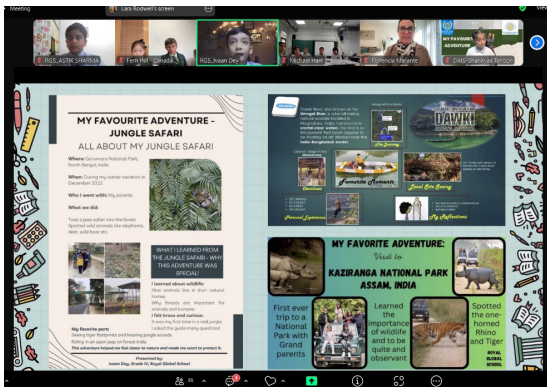
