The semi-finals and finals were especially thrilling, with several nail-biting finishes.

Our students also participated in AVS-MUN, earning multiple awards, and in the Sri Debate in Delhi, where they held their ground with admirable determination. The month concluded with a Round Square Postcard Session on "Can the Democratic Response Tackle the Climate Crisis?" hosted by Royal Global School, featuring a thought-provoking introduction and vibrant exchanges of ideas.




























The Pi-Mpossible Challenge: A Mathematical Showdown



Royal Global School recently hosted the Royal Maker Camp, a dynamic three-day event focused on robotics, artificial intelligence, coding, physical computing and aeromodelling, starting on 4th July, 2025. The camp was led by Director Arup Mukhopadhyay and Camp Coordinator Nabojyoti Gupta, in partnership with STEM education provider Sparkbee.

Students in the city participated actively, constructing remote-controlled robots, programming line-following bots, and building automated traffic circuits. They also experimented with advanced electronic circuits, logic gates, and intelligent automation systems, while exploring aerodynamics through practical rocket and glider projects.

RGS Director Arup Kr. Mukhopadhyay highlighted the camp's objective: "Our aim was to ignite curiosity and foster practical, experiential learning. The students' enthusiasm and collaboration were truly inspiring."

Parents welcomed the camp's interactive approach, noting a marked boost in their children's confidence and engagement with STEM subjects.

The facilitators ensured an inclusive and respectful exchange of perspectives throughout the event.


Royal Global School students led with confidence, clarity, and exceptional coordination.
