Message from the Director

Dear Parents, Students, and Members of the RGS Community

November has been an eventful month at Royal Global School-one that truly shows how vibrant, energetic, and emotionally rich a school community can be. As the early winter breeze touched Guwahati, our campus warmed up with learning, sportsmanship, creativity, and meaningful engagement. I am delighted to share a glimpse of what we achieved together.

We began the month by hosting the All Assam Inter-School Chess Competition, a remarkable event that welcomed nearly 700 young participants from across the state. The energy on campus was inspiring. Soon after, the much-loved Royal Premier League (RPL) – Season 2 brought the entire school alive with team spirit. Out of 12 enthusiastic teams and 15 thrilling matches, the Winged Conquerors, led by Gautam Sharma, lifted the trophy this year.



Our Girls' Cricket Team represented us proudly at the CBSE National Meet in Bhopal-a commendable achievement that motivates our younger sportswomen. Meanwhile, our campus celebrated Children's Day and Grandparents' Day with tremendous enthusiasm. These events reminded us how essential intergenerational bonding is for children's emotional and social development.

We also observed two culturally significant days-the 53rd Birth Anniversary of Zubeen Garg and the 14th Death Anniversary of Dr. Bhupen Hazarika-through music, competitions, performances, and storytelling. It is always heart-warming to see students connect deeply with Assam's cultural icons.

Our Community Service Wing deserves special appreciation. On Children's Day, our students generously donated part of their pocket money to provide books, stationery, pencils, and sweets to children in an orphanage and Nortap village. In another act of kindness, our students distributed warm clothes to support staff members. Acts like these reflect the heart of RGS.

Students of Grades 4 and 5 had an enriching excursion to Manas National Park, where learning came alive through nature and exploration.

While we celebrate achievements, it is equally important to address challenges. Despite the positive energy on campus, I am concerned to see a noticeable rise in aggression,

impulsivity, and denial behaviour among some students-especially in the junior and middle years. Aggression in children often emerges from impulsivity, hyperactivity, unmet emotional needs, fear, frustration, or lack of boundaries. As educators and parents, we must work together to guide our children with empathy and firmness.

Below are a few strategies we urge families to follow consistently at home, which we are also practicing at school:

Young children respond beautifully to music. Simple lyrics that promote sharing, gentleness, and kindness work wonders. Stories help children understand emotions, behaviour, and consequences in a non-threatening way. Children thrive when they can talk openly. Encourage discussions on what behaviours are acceptable and what are not.

When a child becomes unmanageable, a brief “quiet time” near the teacher helps them calm down without shame. Play with your child, observe behaviour patterns, and spend uninterrupted time together.

Help children understand that actions have consequences. Avoid shouting; instead, use firm and calm explanations. Teach children to name their feelings-anger, sadness, fear, frustration. Art, play, journaling, and conversation help them express safely.

They should be engaged in research, discussions, projects, debates, and reflective tasks so that their energy is channelled into meaningful, future-ready learning.

Together, let us ensure our children grow into confident, emotionally balanced, and compassionate young people.

We are awaiting for the two big shows - Royal Symphony and the Founder's Day in December.

As your Director, I look forward to seeing our students shine on stage, on the field, and in the classroom-each in their own unique way.

In closing, We-parents and teachers-must continue to work hand in hand. Let us reaffirm our commitment to providing a holistic, interdisciplinary, value-driven education that helps every Royalite grow with confidence.

I look forward to meeting many of you during our upcoming events. Thank you for your trust and partnership.

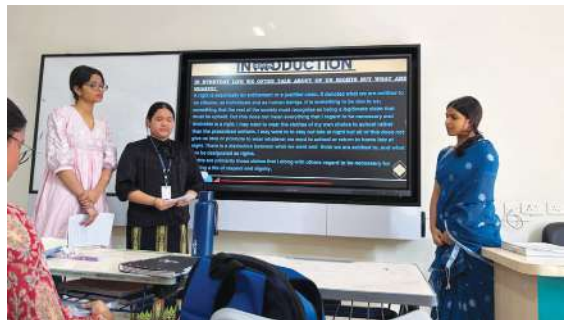

लाचित बोरफुकन असम के अहोम साम्राज्य के महान सेनापति थे, जिनका जन्म 24 नवंबर 1622 को हुआ था। उन्होंने साहस, नेतृत्व और देशभक्ति से असमिया संस्कृति को बचाने में अहम भूमिका निभाई।
